**What do you hope for the next 40 years?
Six VicTas Moderators (former and current) share their hopes.**

(Sharon Hollis) I have been privileged to meet and speak with several people who were involved in the work of forming the Uniting Church. What has stayed with me from those conversations was the deep conviction of each of them that seeking union with other Christians was necessary if they were to be faithful to Jesus Christ. As one of them put it: "Union was not a case of ecclesiastical architecture but of costly obedience." A church on a journey, described by our Basis of Union. So I'd like us to take that seriously, and Scripture seriously.

(Alistair Macrae) Hopes for the Uniting Church for the next 40 years ... there is a great line in an old hymn – "I sing a song of the saints of old, or God, faithful, brave and true" which encapsulates my hopes for the Uniting Church, that over the next 40 years we continue to be faithful – that is, that we continue to ground our life in the gospel, unashamedly, and in our own particular version of it.

(Isabel Thomas Dobson) My hopes are less focused on what the Church itself might look like, and more on what the people would be.

(Jason Kiao) We are growing to be a very multicultural church. I'd like us to understand what that means, because we declared that in 1985, as a multicultural church. So what that means for us is really a great future.

(Sue Withers) I mainly wish that the Uniting Church remains very confident. Very confident of who it is, why it gathers, why we gather as Christian communities around Jesus Christ.

(Dan Wootton) My hope is that people of Australia will have begun to see a quality of life in us that is not so much preached about and talked about, but seen. That we propagate less words, and more silent action.

(Alistair Macrae) And I hope we stay a true church – and I mean true in the sense of authentic, that we are a church where people feel that they don't have to pretend, that they can be authentic about the reality of their lives and invite God into whatever it is that they are experiencing, good stuff, tough stuff, challenging stuff.

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
