Certainty in Uncertain Times

We all know that change is a part of life. Sometimes it's positive, and other times less so. But regardless of what form it comes in, you have a choice about how you respond. One of the biggest issues with change is dealing with uncertainty. Because there is no certainty about what will happen during a time of change, many people either try to control events or other people or they simply shut down.



I listened to a webinar the other day by Julie Masters on Future
Crunch and she talked about some of the tensions; both positive and negative that we are all facing in these uncertain times.

- Perfection vs Process We are all in this together and nobody is expecting perfection at the moment, this gives us great opportunities to try new things, to experiment, to trial things. As long as we tell people the processes that we are using they will be forgiving and accepting.
- Efficiency vs adaptability
 Up until now efficiency has been the gold standard but now, we are being called to be adaptable, to embrace change.
- Confidence vs Certainty What keeps organisations small is a focus on confidence, "we will do things when we feel sure or confident". The problem is that confidence never arrives. You get confidence when you show up and do something, when you try something new.
- Apocalyptic vs catalytic destructive vs propulsive How are you looking at things at the moment? Is it the end of the world or is this a time for things to be catalysed into new things? Which side do you want to spend your time and energy in?

How are you facing these uncertain times? How are you holding these tensions in place in your ministry context?

Having faith doesn't mean that we will not have uncertain times, but it does give us hope and hope is a very powerful thing. God is with us; we do not need to be afraid.

"So we say with confidence, 'The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can mere mortals do to me?' Remember your leaders, who spoke the Word of God to you. Consider the outcome of their way of life and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." – Hebrews 13:6-8 NIV

Mental Health Matters

A pastoral care colleague at Sunshine Hospital frames the work we do with the simple observation that humans need to have their suffering witnessed. People need to share their stories and know that their stories are heard and held.

Last week, Rev Jeanne Beale [Deacon] wrote about naming grief in these Corona times. From the loss of little things – the unravelled plans for holidays and kids' birthday parties - to the heavier losses of jobs, connections and safety.

People living with mental and chronic illness are often very familiar with these

kinds of losses that come with a diagnosis. They grieve the loss of relationships, health, mobility, and sometimes independence.

On the road to Emmaus, Jesus came to the two disciples who were confused, scared and grieving and walked with them (Luke 24:15). I wonder how sharing our own grief stories, particularly with those who have lived with mental illness and chronic illness, may deepen our relationships and lead us towards healing.
