Receive the Holy Spirit as Gift

I love receiving a gift.... except when I don't love it! Picture this. A lovely package, beautifully wrapped. Feels kind of squishy and exciting. You sit down to unwrap and the first thing you see is a hint of colour. It's good that you like a bit of colour in your life. You keep unwrapping. There is more colour and polka-dots. The excitement begins to wane. Fully unwrapped you find yourself holding a bright orange and green polka-dot jumper. The giver is watching anxiously, hoping that you will obviously love it as much as they do! Of course, you do!

I am often asked "what do you want for your birthday...Christmas...Father's Day" Noooo – ask something easier! It is often said that it's the thought that counts, but I hear many stories of "regifting". I wonder if we have regifted unwanted gifts? Choosing a gift or indicating a gift preference can be really hard.



Pentecost is a time when we focus on new birth and new life. It is also a time when we receive an incredible gift. In this case the gift giver offers something really amazing. It's a gift that grows with us and changes as we change! Could it be that our God is the perfect gift giver?

I have a saying that I like to use in many contexts. "We are not alone". God is with us. A constant presence that we can be comforted by, guided by and challenged by. Sometimes I wonder how it is that we feel the presence of God? Surely it can only be though the gift of the Holy Spirit.

When I pray, I often find myself asking for wisdom. Wisdom for the words I speak. Wisdom for the actions I choose. Wisdom for the direction I take. Where is it that such wisdom comes from? It could be in something I read or in the advice that I am offered by a caring co-traveller. When I perceive this as an answer to my prayer, I can only assume that it has come through the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Sometimes I find myself in situations where I feel that I am floundering and unsure of myself. Somehow, I get through. It's really great, after such times, when I receive feed-back that expresses appreciation for how things were handled. I believe the presence of God is with us through the Holy Spirit. As a person who seeks God's guidance and wisdom often it is in such cases I can only assume that God's gift to me that grows and changes with me, is sustaining me even in those times when I do not feel in control.

God gives the best gift we can imagine. And the great part is, it can be shared without you losing any of it. Maybe we should be open to regifting the Holy Spirit.

Children & Families Ministry: core issues in diverse contexts


Get equipped for even more effective ministry with children and their families!

"That's really kind of you", I replied, "especially after you baked those lovely scones for us all last week!"

"Fiona, I'm 52 and this is the first time I've ever felt really welcomed in a group. Today I visited another group for a cooking workshop, and I just sat there quietly the whole time. I was too shy and anxious to say anything, and no one spoke to me. But when I come to the Women's Shed, you all welcome me. And I want to say thank you, because you don't know how much it means to me".
